My name is Jen Eskridge and I am thrilled that you are signed up for these new sewing classes offered at Butler Community College. Learning a skill, like sewing, is so much fun and will provide you the confidence to go on from this class to make many things for yourself, your home and your friends.

You've signed up for **Learn to Sew Pillows**. In this class we will learn to sew a centered zipper into a decorative throw pillow. You'll leave the class able to tackle zippers and have a finished 18" square pillow for your home.

**TIPS:** When choosing fabric for your first-ever sewing project, it is smart to take the thrifty road. In this case, decorator weight fabrics are ideal, but very expensive. It will be smarter to purchase something (like quilters cotton) in the \$4-\$8/yard range from Joann's or Hancock's before making the investment in heavier fabrics. These less costly, more novel fabrics will look great in game room or the kids' bedrooms.

Supplies list:

- 2/3 yard of fabric, any width is fine. The cost effective fabric is 44" wide and the home décor fabric is 54-60" wide.
- Coordinating Coats and Clark all-purpose thread.
- Coordinating 16" non-separating Coats and Clark plastic zipper.
- Straight pins
- Scissors, sharp enough to cut through fabric.
- Spray starch for pressing.
- Sewing machine\* + sewing needles, size 11 or size 14 + a zipper foot attachment for the sewing machine. ~most machines come with this attachment, or you can pick one up at the fabric store.

Optional items: Iron + Ironing board. I will bring the two irons + one board I have, but if we have an extra set, it will expedite things at class. Thanks!

Class is at 6pm, at the Butler Andover location on February 18<sup>th</sup>. I look forward to meeting you and I'll see you then!!



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\*I have a couple sewing machines to loan during class time. These are old machines and can be reserved on a first contacted, first reserved basis. It is always better to learn on your own machine, so you'll feel comfortable repeating the steps when you sew on future projects at your home. Please email me if you'd like me to put your name on a machine.
